What are we talking about?

Jail Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) Program

- Satisfy the DOJ & Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
- Provide greater access to care

Reentry Initiatives

- Consolidated Appropriations Act (CAA, 2023)
 - Eligible for Medicaid Reimbursable Funds
 - Under 21 or up to the age of 26 if aged out of foster care
 - Screening & Diagnostic (including physical, dental, behavioral health)
 - Targeted case management
- AB389 1115 Waiver
 - Purpose is to improve access to care and outcomes
 - Covers health services for incarcerated individuals up to 90 days prior to release
 - Can strengthen Jail MOUD, care coordination and reentry



Why it matters?

MOUD Study from Massachusetts

- 6400 people studied 42% (2,688) received MOUD in jail
- 60% (1,613) likely to continue treatment after release (1st 30 days)
- 52% (1,398) lower risk of fatal overdose
- 24% (645) lower risk of nonfatal overdose
- 56% (1,505) lower risk of death from any cause
- 12% (323) lower risk of being reincarcerated
- 16,150 If replicated in one major city in all 50 states
- Over half (1,344) remained on MOUD at 6 months

The results of this study demonstrates that MOUD saves lives, reduces overdoses, and improves reentry outcomes and highlights the significance of reentry efforts with connecting individuals with community resources after release for continuation of care.
