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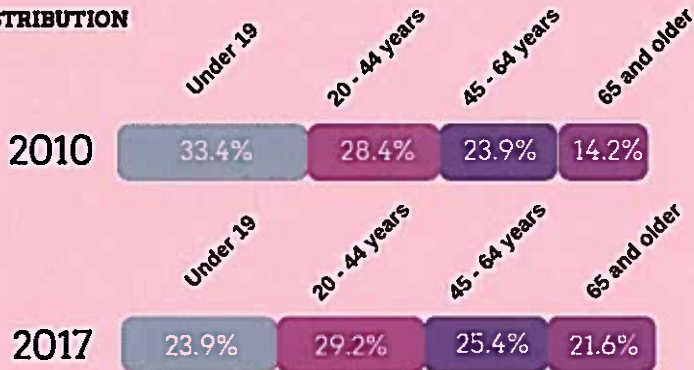

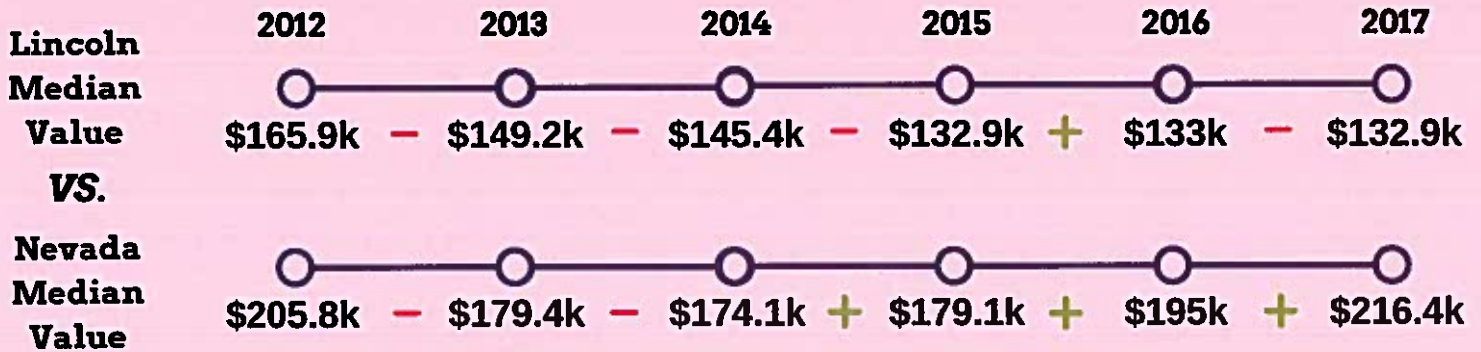

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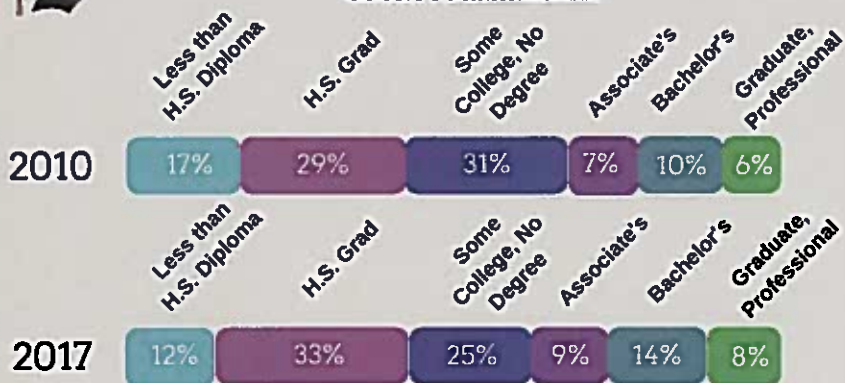

#### COUNTY BREAKDOWN



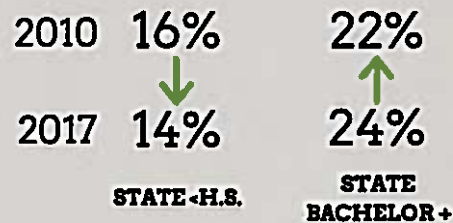
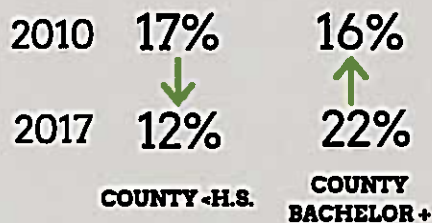

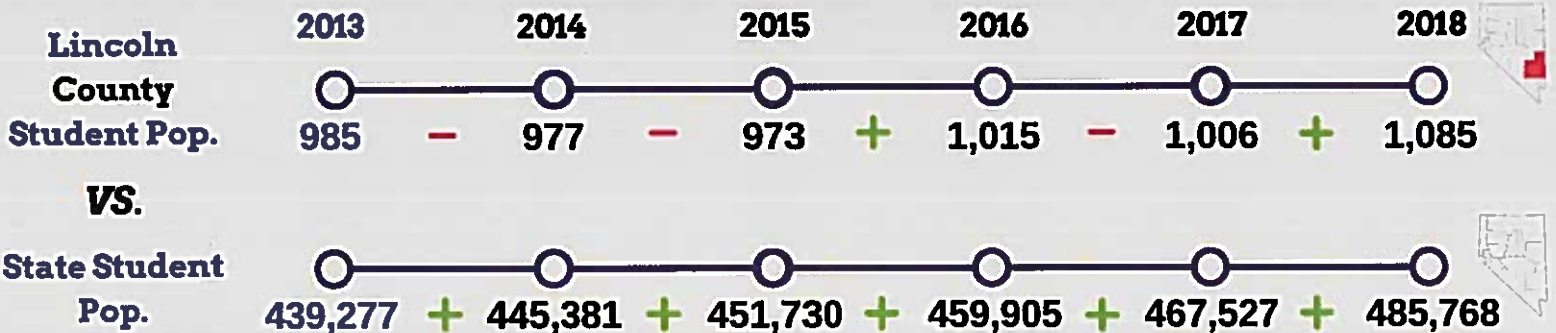

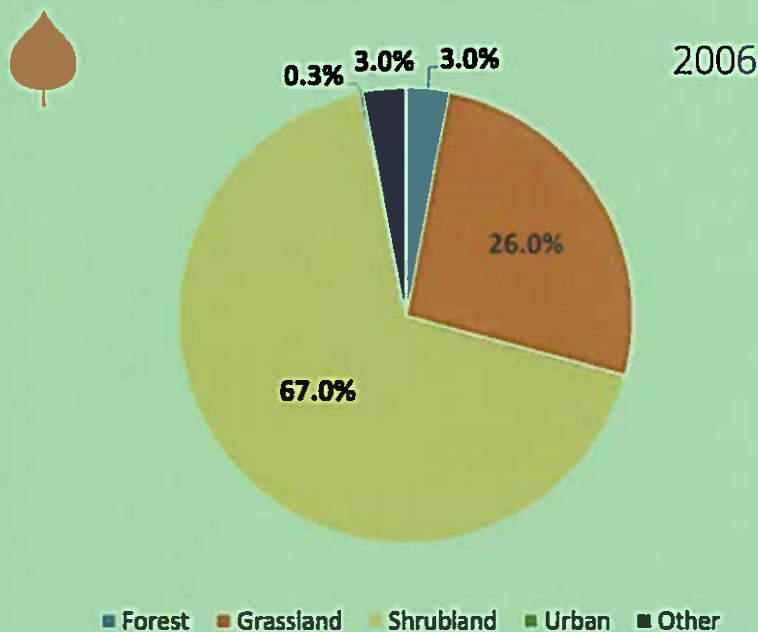

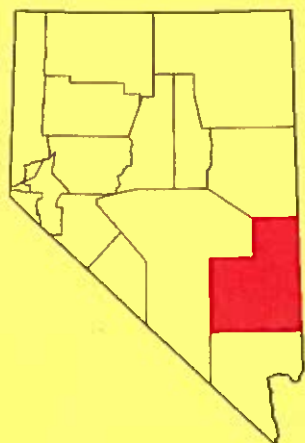

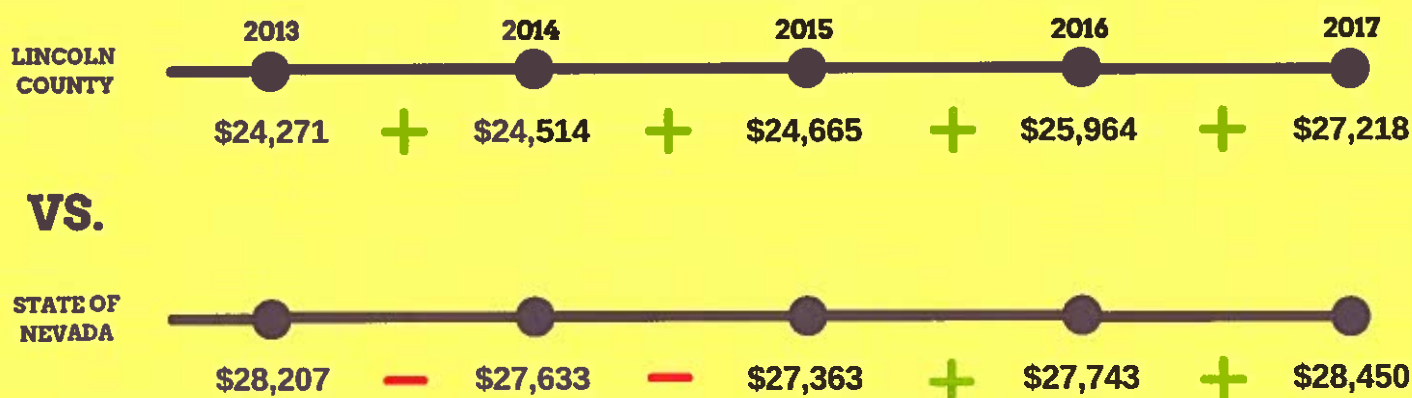

Personal Income ↑

Total personal income fluctuated from 2010 to 2016, dipping in 2013 and then rising again. The overall change is relatively small, at \$500,000.

Wages and Salaries ↑

\$61.7M 2010    \$65.6M 2017

Wages and Salaries shows the highest increase from 2010 to 2012. Since then, the reported number has remained relatively steady.

Proprietor's Income ↓

\$13.5M 2010    \$2.2M 2017

Proprietors' income suffered a huge decrease in this time period, at -84%. Farm proprietors' income makes up a large section of this decrease.
