When people charged with a felony commit a new felony while out on bail or pretrial release, they demonstrate a disregard for the law and continuing threat to the community. The Governor's bill holds felony defendants accountable for new felonies committed while awaiting trial by creating a sentencing enhancement that applies to the new felony. Section 2: Stalking and Cyberstalking Nevada's stalking laws should be strengthened and updated to better address the dynamics of this crime, and how it occurs in the 21st century. The bill recognizes that stalkers often seek to terrorize the victims through their other members of their household or family and empowers prosecutors and law enforcement to hold them accountable. It also addresses stalking that occurs through social media and other electronic means.
